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
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
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
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#### Introduction

About four and a half years ago, I began a project that I believed would be entertaining and instructive. The object of my fascination: published, original comic book art. I knew reviewing art by many of the legends of the industry would entertain me. But I hoped that my studies would yield a good understanding of the art market as well.

After hundreds of hours of work (for each edition), I completed two editions of the Comic Art Trends Price Guide. I called the first edition "Legends", since many of the featured artists began their work in the Golden and Silver Ages. The second edition received the name "Modern Masters". Many of those artists began or contributed prominently in the Bronze and Copper Ages. Before I could author a third edition featuring 21st century artists called "Future Shapers", I ran out of steam!

Meanwhile, the pandemic proved to be a huge period for art sales with exploding prices. Most of the 70+ artists covered by the first two books enjoyed dozens of more sales since the prior publications. Data analysis, graphs, market notes: all of it needed updates. Besides, with four more years of thoughts and observation on the subject of grading original art, I realized my grading scale should be tweaked.

Thus, I am beginning the next edition of the Comic Art Trends Price Guide. But like eating the proverbial elephant, I'm dining one bite at a time. That is, each month or so, I will put out another issue featuring a single artist. Each issue includes art sales gleaned from Heritage Auctions, ComicConnect, and ComicLink. I assign the proprietary, *new and simplified*, CAT grade to each individual piece. Data gets sent through the grinder to produce summary data and related graphs. And I review recent sales and share my personal market analysis for the featured artist. If all of that is too boring, readers can enjoy pictures of both recent sales and spectacular sales by the artist. After all, weren't we all drawn to comics by the pictures!

#### **Contents**

The Comic Art Trends Price Guide compiles and summarizes actual sales information for original published comic book art from selected artists. Presently, the collected information is from sales of art through **Heritage Auctions**, **ComicConnect**, **and ComicLink**. Sales data is extensive, but NOT exhaustive.

The summarized data is organized by (1) artist (2) comic book series title, and (3) date of sale. Each entry includes the issue number, page number, publication date, sales date, sales price, and commentary specific to the art. Additionally, each page of art is identified by a CAT Scale score objectively categorizing the page based on the type of art and content of the page.

When data is available for multiple sales of a particular page of art, a Compounded Growth Rate (CGR) is calculated as an indication of the investment return on that page of art. The following formula is used:

#### CGR = [(Ending Value / Beginning Value)^(12 / # of months)] - 1 (reported as %)

CGR can still be calculated for periods less than a year but may not be as useful as a measure. For example, Aquaman 55 page 3 by Jim Aparo sold for \$2,629 in May '18 but only sold for

\$2,160 in September '18. Over the four-month period, CGR is -44.5%. The actual loss was 18%. The person who purchased in May and sold in September (hopefully) will not continue that pattern and lose 44% over the course of 12 months. Likewise, had the person pocketed an 18% gain, they no longer own the art so they would not end up with a 44% gain for the year.

As an extreme illustration, Jim Aparo art from The Phantom 38 sold as a group in May 2009 for an average price of \$143. A page from that group sold one month later for \$418. The CGR comes to 38,912,000% for that one month! In this case, a more reasonable measure is

#### Net gain = (Ending Value / Beginning Value) – 1 (percentage)

With that approach, the investor still had a healthy 192% gain. When less than twelve months have passed since the prior sale, the net gain or net loss is reported in the CGR column.

My view is that multiple sales within a twelve-month period should be viewed by an investor as a single sale with an average price. I believe that strategy better represents the market and is more useful for comparison. That is, if the same art has sold twice or more within a one-year period, look at an average of the two prices and consider that a good representation of the market price for that art. Art that sold twice during a short period may have been due to a buyer failing to complete the sale.

For each artist, additional information is supplied. Beyond identifying sales information, summary statistics have been calculated by year for each artist's works. Also, a market report discusses interesting recent sales in comparison to past sales. Further, graphs are included to help readers recognize trends for the artist.

Many of the images included in the CAT Price Guide correspond to recent sales. Some images highlight the artist's most important and interesting works. The images also serve to illustrate the *new and simplified* CAT Scale grading system.

More details explaining information in the CAT Price Guide are described below. Neal Adams is featured in the first 2023 CAT Price Guide. Next, I plan to spotlight Arthur Adams, an artist that I've never previously covered.

Each page of art, cover or interior, may be uniquely identified by the combination of Title, Issue Number, Page Number, and Publication Date. When possible, the story page number rather than the page number including advertisements is referenced (see note below).

Note: Source information is not always accurate. Page numbers have been updated to be more accurate and consistent in some cases. Some pages have been identified by their position in the story and other pages have been identified by their position in the comic book. Over time, the preferred option is to identify by story position.

Only published pages are included in the database. I do not exclude pieces of art that sold below a minimum threshold. If I have the sales data, it is included and figures into the summary data.

As previously described, when multiple sales occur for a specific page, it is possible to compare the sales prices and calculate CGR (Compounded Growth Rate). The CGR is specified by a positive or negative percentage. When applicable, a % (percent sign) is used to show a page used in CGR calculations. CGR does not tell the whole story for the current market trends, but it is one useful point of data because it offers a direct comparison to the price change during a period. The formula for CGR is specified above.

The Publication Date indicates when the comic containing the art was published. The Sold Date indicates date of sale at auction. These two dates are both significant for different reasons.

Most artists appear to have a period during their careers when they produced their most desirable works. In the same way that pro athletes in their *prime* may enjoy their most productive years, certain artists have periods of peak skill and fan enthusiasm. Artwork from those special periods may enjoy greater demand when it becomes available. In general, older artwork is more highly sought than newer art when other factors are similar.

Likewise, the Date Sold is significant because of natural economic factors such as inflation. Though demand fluctuates with both the economy and the whims of collectors, overall, more recently sold works cost a premium compared to prices paid for similar artwork in earlier decades. Data spans over 20 years for many artists.

The Comment column serves as a place to note important information about the art including contributors, featured characters, and reasons why a piece is iconic.

The final column is reserved for the source of data. Sales data from **Heritage Auctions** is designated 'HA', ComicConnect is 'CC', and ComicLink is 'CL'.

The Key column contains the Comic Art Trends Grade or CAT Score.

# **CAT Grading Scale**

The 2023 Comic Art Trends Price Guide introduces a brand *new and simplified* grading scale. Observant readers hopefully noticed my emphasis on reducing the complexity of my original CAT scale. The CAT Scale index is a means of objectively identifying each page of art. Grades are based on CONTENT, not the CONDITION of the paper. When I grade a page, I consider the featured characters and the portion of the art devoted to those characters. If the art board is yellowing or ragged on the edge, it is still the one and only original art for that published work.

Original comic art features enduring characters from the Golden Age like Superman, Batman, Captain America, and Wonder Woman. Stars from the Silver Age like Spider-Man, Fantastic Four, the Avengers, X-Men, and the rebirthed DC heroes all garner collector attention when featured on original art. Even super-villains like the Joker, Thanos, and Green Goblin are highly collectable. These, and the most prolific newer heroes, are treated as Grade A heroes in the new CAT Grading Scale. (See the grading scale for other characters treated as Grade A.)

I changed the definition of Grade A characters in my revised scoring because data supported the notion that many of the significant heroes and villains of Marvel beyond Spider-man and the X-Men deserved 'Grade A' treatment. In addition, by using the Grade A rather than Grade B scale, it is easier to differentiate pieces of art based on the portion of the page devoted to those characters. Ultimately, when comparing pages of art, it is useful to compare pages featuring like characters. So, for example, comparing a Wolverine page by an artist to another Wolverine page by the same artist is more reasonable regardless of whether Wolverine is treated as Grade A or Grade B.

Though the group of Grade A characters has expanded, I still believe there is a necessary distinction between the most recognizable characters and others that play less significant roles, whether they be heroes or villains. Further, many of the humorous characters, though reasonably famous, will continue to be graded as B or C characters. Please see the guidance below related to B and C characters.

As before, the grading scale considers three types of art: Covers, Splashes, and interioRs. Covers refer to front covers only, usually the most recognizable part of any comic. Back covers (BC), inside front covers (IFC), title splash pages, and interior pages where one panel dominates will typically receive a grade beginning with "S" for splash. InterioR panel pages will generally receive a grade beginning with an "R".

The CAT Scale ranges from 1 to 15. The higher the score, the more desirable. Higher grades don't always translate into higher prices. However, the data supports the overall relationship between the CAT Scale and prices. Further, the basic scale reflects what art connoisseurs intuitively recognize.

- 15 Golden Iconic Cover reserved for the absolute most significant comic covers in history.
- 12 **Golden Iconic Interior** reserved for the interior pages of the most significant comics.
- 10 **Industry Recognized Landmark** Silver age #1s, 1<sup>st</sup> appearances of major characters, major transformation books, widely recognizable works, best of the best
- 8 Classic Pages from the Golden Age prominently featuring the most popular heroes of today
- 7 **Superior Grade A** Most well-known heroic characters from major publishers; select villains like the Joker and other easily recognizable archenemies; pulp heroes like Tarzan, Doc Savage, the Shadow; best known Disney characters, Looney Tunes, Archie, A-List Celebrities. Grade A characters often have a greater media and cultural presence than Grade B and C characters that may only be known to highly devoted comic book fans.
- 6 **Average Grade A** pages prominently featuring Grade A but not in a superior fashion, superior pages where Grade A characters are featured on 2/3 of the page
- 5 **Superior Grade B** action-packed pages featuring major heroes and villains of the DC and Marvel Universes that are not Grade A.
- 4 Less of page devoted to Grade A and B; superior Horror, Sci-Fi, War art featuring less of major heroes, or superior art in genres such as Horror, Sci-Fi, War.

- 3 **Superior Grade** C **Hero** Independent publisher heroes and less significant DC and Marvel heroes. Less significant teams are Grade C. Grade A and B characters on 1/3 or less of page.
- 2 **Secret Identities and Supporting Characters** major characters have a well-known cast of supporting characters that are also of interest to collectors. Heroes can't always be in costume. Good Horror, Sci-Fi, and War page may be assigned a grade of 2.
- 1 **Forgotten characters and uncredited extras** pages that do not feature recognizable characters receive the lowest grade. Pages with cameo appearances of lesser-known characters also receive this grade.
- G Group score when multiple pages are sold as a lot, I grade the G roup based on the number of pages of art, Gx. Sometimes the group of pages are from multiple comics which makes it more challenging to use the data for summary analysis.
- CS Complete Stories when a group of pages are sold as a Complete Story, I assign a grade of CSx. I don't individually grade the pages of a complete story because it is impossible to assign the specific value of the sale to each page. Thus, I treat it as an average cost per page.

The Scale is affected by the percentage of the page devoted to the characters on the page. The amount of the page devoted to Batman affects the score according to the grades in the table. For example, a page featuring Batman on 2/3 of the panels may score CAT 5 and a cameo appearance may score only CAT 3. Lesser heroes and villains also impact the page's interest depending on how many panels feature those characters.

In my prior grading scale, I introduced the concept of Plus Ones. In order to simplify and reduce subjectivity, I no longer make Plus One or Minus One adjustments. (And since I'm grading hundreds of pages of art for each artist, that really expedites grading!) The elimination of plus ones and minus ones also applies for two-page spreads and partial pages. However, I do believe two-page spreads are more desirable than a single page and partial pages are less desirable. Collectors and investors should consider that while doing their own comparisons.

On the topic of Grade A characters, wild prices paid for art featuring the current media darlings drives my philosophy change. Even though I still believe there are only a few truly enduring characters, by adjusting my scale to better differentiate art featuring Werewolf by Night or Moon Knight, it helps investors make more specific comparisons. I implore readers to wisely view external stimuli like "movies" that produce unnatural, potentially reckless, demand for less renowned characters. Going back to Werewolf by Night, the character has been around for fifty years receiving only mild attention before announcement of a Disney+ series.

Bottomline, the "big event" or "key" stimulus is one of the greatest drivers for outlandish prices in the market. Collectors and investors must understand the impact. True fans are unaffected (unless their favorite characters/artists get priced out of their range!).

In this issue, better known characters were treated as Grade A. The following were categorized as B and C:

Grade B: Deadman, Captain Marvel (Kree), Creeper, Man-Bat, Challengers of the Unknown, Hawk & Dove, The Losers

Grade C: Iron Jaw, Tomahawk, Ms. Mystic.



#### **Examples of artwork excluded from the CAT Price Guide**

Unpublished, re-creation, sketches, advertising, prints and remarques, color guides, comic strips

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# What Original Comic Art is Excluded?

The Comic Art Trends Price Guide intentionally limits its scope to only *published* original comic book art. The following types of art are NOT included.

- Illustrations and sketches
- Record comics and other promotional art including calendar art
- Promotional and giveaway comics
- Alternative, unpublished art
- Color guides, color proofs and production art/Xeroxes
- Re-creation art
- Preliminary pencil sketches/storyboards not used for production even if part of an artist's personal development process
- Newspaper comic strip art
- Art for comic books published outside the United States of America
- Covers for novels, trade paperback **reprints**, and hard cover compilation books. *Note: the 2023 guide includes TPB covers when listed in the Overstreet Comic Book Price Guide*
- Art for fanzines and popular magazines
- Original art inks on blue line prints NOT used in the production of comic books. Note: the
  normal artistic process now often involves using "ink only" art pages in the production process.
  These are INCLUDED in the CAT Price Guide.

All the above types of art are immensely collectable as evidenced by the realized prices at auction. For example, a Bill Watterson's Sunday strip sold in Nov. 2022 for nearly half a million dollars. The same month, John Buscema's Silver Surfer 4 re-creation featuring Thor fetched over \$20 Grand. Bill Sienkiewicz created a Marvel Super Special 36 Dune painting that was not published. It sold for \$43,000 in January of this year.

Many fans and speculators have sought art like Color Guides and Production Proofs as a less expensive opportunity to own a piece of art that was part of the comic production process.

The primary reason for limiting the scope of the CAT Price Guide is because the universe of collectable comic art is too big to capture in one guide. I would gladly add the art described to my collection, but here are the reasons for excluding them from this guide:

- Illustrations and sketches are impossible to uniquely identify.
- Unpublished covers and pages cannot be verified or dated against a published standard.
- Promotional and giveaway comics are often illustrated by studio artists. Mis-attributed artists
  are a major issue for the CAT Price Guide and investors who may pay thousands for art that
  simply looks like it was done by a master.
- Color guides and production proofs from the seventies and earlier should be highly sought due
  to technology changes and the rarity of early production materials, but they fall outside of the
  intent of the CAT Price Guide.
- Re-Creation art is a great alternative for people that can't afford an original Michelangelo or Da Vinci, but re-creations are ultimately unpublished illustrations.
- For the present, newspaper art, foreign comic art, cover art to novels, and fanzines are
  excluded. Art from TPBs identified in the Overstreet Price Guide are now included (at least to
  the best of my ability).

The first objective of the Comic Art Trends Price Guide is to identify, organize, and categorize original comic art. The limited scope described helps to accomplish that purpose. Published comic art follows conventions and regular practices that make it easier to uniquely specify a piece of art. Conventional forms of visual storytelling break pages into panels suggesting an objective standard to compare two pages of art. The fact that modern comics typically identify artists serves a great purpose for organization and validation of the artists in greatest demand. The second objective of the CAT Price Guide is even more dependent on limited scope. The statistical analysis and summary information provided by the guide is most useful when differentiators are in place. For example, is the page a cover, splash page or interior art? When was the art produced and by whom? Not all covers are created equal, so the statistics should (where possible) reflect the various grades created to describe the art. Limiting the scope is a necessary evil for reasonable statistical differentiation.

Advances in modern technology present other challenges for comic art buyers. In days past an artist used pencils and paper to layout the art. Then, those pages might be mailed or delivered to another artist who applied India ink to finish the page. By virtue of the process, a piece of original art used for production was unique. But the process was time consuming and labor intensive.

Computer technology is making that process outdated. The pencil artist may be using a computer stylus rather than a piece of wood containing graphite. Even when using a pencil, that artist likely is scanning the art into a computer and using software to convert to a blue line rendering. The blue line can be rendered invisible for printing purposes, so it makes an excellent guide, especially when printed on nice clean paper, for the inker. The inker, if still using India ink, can then create an inks-only piece of original art that can be used for production purposes. Thus, **newer original art for sale is often only** *original* **inks or original pencils, not both.** 

Some artists are creating both pencils and inks using computer software. In such cases, there is no actual original production artwork. However, as a source of revenue, artists can print blue line copies of the art and ink them by hand. Obviously, there is nothing other than personal integrity preventing those artists from creating several copies.

When an inked blue line piece of art is used in production, it will be considered for inclusion in the Comic Art Trends database. Over time, it will be obvious if these pieces of art are highly regarded by the collector's market or not. Inked blue line art used in production still presents a dilemma for collectors. Obviously, the inker deserves his normal credit for the work done. However, is it appropriate to consider art that does not contain any original pencils as art by the pencil artist as well. This is a grey area, or perhaps, a blue line area that I desire feedback from the seller and buyer community for advice moving forward.

# **Zillions: Buying Comic Art for Investment**

Zillions is a play on one of Richie Rich's comic book titles... unfortunately, it likely won't describe how much money that you will make buying and selling original comic art. That said, original comic art is a viable investment when treated as other investments.

Before going further, the Comic Art Trends Price Guide does NOT offer original art for sale. Nor does the author sell any original comic book art.

Let me also say that neither the author nor the Price Guide is making any statements about suitable investments for any individual nor does the author or Price Guide make any investment advice beyond general statements.

What are some considerations and questions?

#### Determine how much money you have for investment.

One important thing to consider: investment art is completely tailorable to the amount of money one has for investment. Several pieces of art described in this book sold for hundreds of thousands of dollars. A few pieces will likely top a million dollars if they make it to the market, BUT a guy with a hundred bucks (or less) can even get a nice return on art as well. For example, 20 years ago I bought 5 assorted pages of Marvel art sight unseen for \$35. The most miserable of the bunch would fetch \$40 today easily. A few of the pages are comparable to art listed in this book that sold for a few hundred dollars.

The bottom line is that art is available for sale in nearly any price range, therefore, it is up to the individual to determine how much to spend on investment art.

#### How long must one hold a page of art to make a profit?

Like all investments, there is NO guarantee of a positive rate of return. For that matter, there is no guarantee that the investor will get anything for a page of art regardless of what he paid for it or how long it is held.

Since an object of art is only worth what someone is willing to pay, some pages of art may decrease in value over time if the artist or featured characters are forgotten. I have observed MANY examples of excellent pages of art that unfortunately sold for less than the prior purchase price. Almost always, that disappointment occurs when the art is resold too quickly, such as within two years. Note: dealers or people who buy art at auction and then put it up for sale at a fixed price do not face the same constraints as an auction planned on a set date. Therefore, a quick-turn sale for a fixed-price dealer could be good if they happen to find a buyer willing to meet their price.

See the CGR column in my tables for examples of resale prices on specific pages of art. The CGR column shows the Compounded Growth Rate. Most of the negative CGRs occur when there is a quick re-sale.

As a caution, it is apparent from prices of some Golden Age and comic strip art that not every page of art grows or even retains value over time. If characters are no longer actively published, it is difficult to maintain collector interest. To reiterate, it is possible for a page of art to be virtually worthless over time.

Considering trends and recent comparable sales may help an investor determine if a piece of art has appreciated enough to turn a profit. The cost to sell must be factored into the bottom-line calculation of net profit.

#### What art should I buy?

Many types of investment, such as a bond or tax lien, don't carry much personal enjoyment beyond the expected rate of return and the use of that money at some time in the future. Art and other collectibles have an innate advantage over those investment vehicles. If the individual purchasing the art enjoys it, then it may have sentimental value beyond what it can be sold for at auction.

If the investment art is by a favorite artist or features a favorite character, then enjoying the art goes beyond a future payout. In fact, even if the art becomes worthless, it still has value to the owner.

That said, there are some artists and characters that will have a greater likelihood of maintaining and increasing in monetary value compared to others in the industry. The name of the artist plays a huge role in what people will pay for that art. People want to buy art by the top names in the field. This is true for comic art and fine art alike.

I've been to the Louvre. Most fine art looks the same to me... but I've heard of Da Vinci, Michelangelo, and Renoir. That alone makes their work more interesting. Comic art is the same—Kirby, Adams, and Miller, to mention a few, are names that people recognize.

Buying art by the top names in the industry is obviously one viable strategy. The stock market works on the same principle.

A more analytical strategy can be achieved from data in this book. By determining the CAT Scale score for a page of art, one can review similar art by the same artist. The numerical sales and trend data provided in the Comic Art Trends Price Guide may help when evaluating if a page of art may be a good purchase for long-term investment.

If you asked me what art I would buy, personally, I would start with what I enjoy.

#### Where may original comic art be purchased? In other words, where is the market?

Purchasing original comic art for investment is easy. Tons of places sell comic art: online, brick and mortar stores, auction houses, direct from the source (or their dealers), conventions, etc. Amazing quantities of high-quality art are available weekly, monthly, and quarterly from sources like Heritage Auctions, ComicConnect.com/Metropolis Comics, and ComicLink.com Certainly, I encourage you to check out all the vendors who are supporting this project with their advertisements. Let them know you appreciate their help in getting the Comic Art Trends Price Guide into publication. Bottomline, go looking for good deals!

#### Besides art in this book, what other art is good for investing?

This price guide specializes in published art used in comic book stories, but as previously mentioned, a wide variety of artwork is aesthetically pleasing as well as holding speculative value for future returns. Calendars, promotional comic art, convention sketches, and many more that I have excluded are interesting for collection and investment.



Neal Adams (1941 - 2022) The passing of Neal Adams in 2022 was a tough blow to family, friends, and fans of Neal Adams. My favorite artist will be remembered and renowned for his work on creator rights and his artistic skills well beyond his generation. But I'll fondly recall his work on the Spectre and Deadman. Two characters outside my normal realm of interest. I'll passionately reread classic Batman tales penciled by Adams, and often inked by Dick Giordano. And I'll TREASURE my beat-up copy of Superman vs. Muhammad Ali—even though I probably rooted for George Foreman or Joe Frazier in those titanic boxing battles. Though, time inevitably erodes our collective memory of the greats, I hope people don't too soon forget Neal Adams.

#### Market Report - Neal Adams

A lot has happened since the most spectacular sale of Neal Adams' art to date. In November 2019, cover art featuring the Joker in Batman 251 sold for \$600,000. You recall, in 2019 people gathered for events such as Heritage's Signature auction. To some extent, fear of Covid has diminished enough that people have returned to big gatherings that are important to them. Regardless, the passion for comics and comic related collectibles remained undaunted throughout the pandemic, despite dire news. In fact, the comic and art collecting bug is healthier than ever. (Assuming you believe fever-like prices are a good sign.)

During 2020 to 2021, 43 art lots have sold through Heritage Auctions, ComicConnect, and ComicLink that I recorded for the Comic Art Trends Price Guide. These lots represent published original comic art spanning 1967 to 2014. Sales included covers, splashes, and interior panel pages, primarily from DC and Marvel.

Twenty-one Adams covers sold at auction; a few are inks-only for Curt Swan pencils. Unexpected 114 cover art featured no recognizable characters and sold for only \$6,300. Two other horror covers from the era fared better, averaging roughly double the price. Adams has also done some variant covers this century. As modern works they sell for less, though his Amazing Spider-Man 1 (2014) cover fetched over 18 grand. Superman, Green Lantern, Batman, and the Justice League drew the most attention at auction. Green Lantern 77 sold for *just slightly less than* the \$442,000 issue 76 cover art sold for. GL/GA 76 is iconic and revolutionary, but the \$84,000 for Green Lantern 77 art represented a solid price. That's 30 to 50 thousand dollars more than most recent covers featuring Superman, Batman, and the Justice League. Batman 226 cover art performed well at \$52,800. However, when I consider the impact of Neal Adams on the industry, and then think about Batman, certainly among the top 3 comic icons, fifty grand seems dirt cheap! The top cover art sale almost missed this guide. Superman 252 wrap-around cover art sold for \$200,000 in December of 2021.

Some significant Marvel interior art sold in the last two years. I will start with X-Men 61 Page 9. Selling in 2020 for \$13,800, I was surprised it didn't do better. Adams interior art is rare, and his short X-Men run made fans salivate for more. The page sold two years earlier for \$12,000, thus the compounded growth rate comes to only 7.6%. This sale came early in the pandemic, maybe collector appetites were not quite whetted. Three premium Avengers pages (R7,R7,S5) fared well compared to earlier sales of Adams Avengers works. The recent sales averaged \$25,200 ranging from \$20,400 to \$31,200. These sales occurred in 2021 and late 2020. Three sales of similarly graded pages (R7,R6,R7) sold in the range \$7,768 to \$13,145 from 2015-2018.

Deadman is an iconic character for Adams. Though I am no longer doing Plus One characters for artists, that doesn't mean fans don't notice when art from Strange Adventures comes to auction. I scored Deadman as a grade B character. Four interior page sales averaged \$9,375 in 2020-2021. Three of the pages scored R5 meaning Deadman figured prominently in the art. In 2017, Strange Adventures 208 Page 2 sold for almost \$18,000. That page also scored R5. However, the majority of sales in the R4-R5 range averaged around five grand. Issue 208 had a two-page Deadman splash that sold for over \$10,000 in 2016. Someone may be trying to get the entire issue 208 art, because pages from that story all seem to be higher than other issues.

Jerry Lewis and Bob Hope form an unlikely pair in the Neal Adams bibliography. Fans of funnymen picked up a title page from Adventures of Jerry Lewis for \$1,680 and two pages from Adventures of Bob Hope for \$1,110. As long as I live, I will remember the works of these two comedians. Then again, I'm old so I'm dubious of the long term collectability of comics and art featuring real life people from MUCH earlier eras.

Finishing on a strong note, page 20 from Green Lantern 76 sold for \$20,750 at the end of 2020. I DO believe in the power of buying interior pages from iconic issues, first appearances, first issues, etc. Not everyone can own the uber-recognizable cover of GL 76, but owning one of 20 or so pages of that landmark story represents a nice score as well.

A couple of interesting 2022 sales stand out. The first page of Brave and the Bold 84 [S6] features a brooding Batman. It fetched \$28,000. Generally, Adams B&B art seems relatively affordable but maybe this sale suggests strengthening in the niche. Also, an Oliver Queen page [R2] from Green Lantern 85 "Snowbirds Don't Fly" raised a price of \$14,400. Previously,

page 3 sold for \$5,258 in 2017. That's a CGR of 25.6%! And speaking again of Deadman, Adams cameoed on a George Tuska page. Challengers of the Unknown 74 Page 1 sold for \$3,840 in January 2022. Twice before the page sold: for \$3,107 in 2018 and \$1,380 in 2004.




